





## TEEN ACTION COUNCIL

The Teen Action Council (TAC) is a youth-led, adult-guided coalition that strives to create youth connections, provide community outreach, and support youth advocacy. TAC youth educate their peers in hopes to prevent substance misuse and mental health challenges. They do this by working together as a team to plan and implement activities.

TAC accomplishes their mission by;

# GIVING YOUTH A VOICE, PROVIDING YOUTH AN OUTLET, AND SHOWING YOUTH THEIR REASON.

TAC focuses on facilitating accessible and open community collaboration between sectors in order to create a well-trained prevention-focused team, and optimize the amount of youth being served through TAC. TAC focuses on engaging youth and families in evidence-based prevention activities to increase the knowledge and preparation of the target population to make substance-free choices. TAC addresses youth substance use by engaging the target population, youth, in the planning and implementation of strategies and activities. By providing training opportunities such as the CADCA National Leadership Forum, Teen Leadership Summit, and training on the Strategic Prevention Framework Model, we are creating a youth prevention workforce in Wilkes. This workforce is vital in reducing/preventing substance use issues among youth by discovering and appropriately addressing the local conditions that are driving substance use.

#### ADULT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

At the beginning of the year we saw TAC making big moves in the community. So, we convened a panel of adult stakeholders in our community in order to guide and advise TAC. We felt that alongside these adults, our teens would have the resources needed to make Wilkes a better place for our youth.

These members bring a variety of experience to our youth. We have local business owners, healthcare workers, public safety employees, members of local churches and educators to bring ideas and support to our teens.

#### PEACH FESTIVAL

WYLD volunteers attended the Peach Festival where they distributed over 50 medication lockboxes and disposal kits along with educational materials to improve medication safety in Wilkes.

#### CORNHOLE

We continued our Cornhole Tournament fundraising series through October 2022. Through our fundraising series, we raised \$6,118.

#### RACETRACK REVIVAL

WYLD volunteers worked at The North Wilkesboro Speedway during the Racetrack Revival in August. Volunteers parked cars and raised \$5,000 to support WYLD activities and initiatives.

#### BACK TO SCHOOL BASH

In partnership with the Downtown Wilkesboro Merchants' Association, WYLD hosted the 2nd annual Back to School Bash where we provided school supplies to over 250 youth to ensure a successful start to the 2022-2023 school year.

#### YOUTH FOCUS GROUPS

In September, Teen Action Council members hosted focus groups for youth at Dom Bakeries to determine needs and perceptions around youth mental health and substance use challenges with 15 youth participants.

# SPOOKTACULAR AND TRAIL OF TREATS

Youth and volunteers distributed candy and 200 medication lockboxes to Wilkes County youth and families during the Towns Halloween festivities.

#### LIGHT UP DOWNTOWN

TAC partnered with local businesses to secure sposorships for photo backdrops to be used during Light Up Downtown. These backdrops provided opporunties for families to come together for photo opportunities and was a great fundraiser for TAC raising almost \$1.500.











# TEEN MENTAL HEALTH FIRST-AID

In December, Luke participated in the teen Mental Health First Aid facilitator training with funding support from the Wilkes Community Foundation. As a facilitator, Luke will be able to train youth ages 15-18 to recognize and respond to mental health challenges among their peers

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH

WYLD raised money to provide overnight stays for individuals and families who did not have adequate housing during the extreme cold front that came through over Christmas. In partnership with Wilkes Recovery Revolution, Inc., we were able to ensure 42 individuals had access to sufficient shelter.

# NATIONAL LEADERSHIP FORUM

Through scholarships from CADCA and Community Impact NC we were able to take four TAC members to National Harbor, MD where they were able to learn from youth and adults from across the country as well as go to Capitol Hill and speak with our senators about issues they feel are important in Wilkes County.

#### SPACHETTI DINNER

In less than two weeks, TAC secured donations from several local businesses to host a Valentine's Day spaghetti dinner fundraiser where they were able to raise \$700.

#### TAC'LIN THE WYLD LIFE

Teen Action Council members started a podcast to create a safe space for youth to talk and share about their life experiences. To date, they have released 11 episodes that have reached over 250 youth.

#### SPF - RX

In March 2023, WYLD received a \$31,263 multi-year grant through the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services to address prescription drug misuse.



#### SOR - III

In May 2023, WYLD received a \$100,000 multi-year grant through the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services to address youth opioid misuse through the Reconnecting Youth and Celebrating Families! programs.





WYLD had two different volunteer opportunities arise during Merlefest. We were able to partner with Merlefest to conduct traffic control to protect pedestrians entering and leaving the festival. We also had the opportunity to park cars in the American Specialty Windows parking lot. In total, we were able to raise \$4,000 during Merlefest weekend.

#### CYCLOVIA



TAC hosted a Bikeswap during Cyclovia where kids and adults could swap their old bikes or get a bike if they did not have one. They were able to get five bikes donated to provide to the community.

## WYLD - AF (ALCOHOL FREE)

In partnership with The Block, TAC hosted four after prom parties, where they had 606 kids come out to skate, play gellyball, and spend time with friends after prom. 475 kids also signed a pledge saying they would abstain from drugs and alcohol on prom night.



#### TEEN LEADERSHIP SUMMIT

Seven members of TAC attended the annual Teen Leadership Summit hosted by Teen Health Connections in Charlotte, NC. Two of our kids were able to serve on staff and two kids were elected to serve on the Youth Impact NC state coalition.

#### LOCK YOUR MEDS

WYLD continued promoting the NC Lock Your Meds campaign to inform community members about the importance of safely storing and disposing of prescription medications.



#### OPIDID SETTLEMENT FUNDING

In June, we officially received \$11,000 through the Opioid Settlement funding to expand the teen Mental Health First Aid program to all local high schools.

# WHAT'S UP NEXT ...

**Space:** WYLD is actively looking for a permanent place to call home. When we first started, we bounced from coffee shop to coffee shop and met with youth in the upstairs of Dom Bakeries. In June we moved into The Masthead and have been able to call it home for the past few months. With TAC expanding rapidly and the need for afterschool youth programs, we feel that moving into our own facility will allow us to grow our impact on Wilkes County youth.

**Van:** Transportation is a huge need across our community and that need has become even more obvious when working with youth. From needing a ride from school to weekly meetings to heading to Washington, D.C. for leadership training, finding transportation has been a continued challenge. Everytime we need a 15 passenger van for an event, we have had to look outside of Wilkes and the rental fees have been extremely high. We believe that the addition of a van will enable us to expand and enhance our ability to best serve youth.

**Food Truck**: We are currently planning a multi-prong social impact program to support youth workforce development using a unique approach to the food insecurity issue in our community. Utilizing a pay what you can model will cultivate a needed service for those negatively impacted by food insecurity while also allowing youth to serve their community with a sense of pride and ownership.
